## Hopeful Aging Research •

John Zeisel PhD, Hon. D.Sc. I'm Still Here Foundation

John Zeisel is the author of *I'm Still Here, A Breakthrough Approach to Understanding Someone Living with Alzheimer's* and Founding Board Member of the I'm Still Here Foundation. He holds a PhD in Sociology from Columbia University, a Loeb Fellowship from Harvard's Graduate School of Design, and an Honorary Science Doctorate from Salford University in the UK.

The I'm Still Here Foundation grants seed funding to small organizations, especially in underserved communities, to develop innovative nonpharmacological interventions reflecting the principles of dignity, engagement, community, and learning aimed at improving the wellbeing of persons living with dementia. Together with the Foundation, Hopeful Aging develops evidence-based engagement programs for persons living with dementia, including tablet-based group activities that can be led directly by persons with dementia, age-appropriate reading materials, and personalized music programs.

His most recent publication— *Design, Dignity, Dementia: the 2020 World Alzheimer's Report*—with psychologist Richard Fleming and Architect Kirsty Bennett for Alzheimer's Disease International (ADI), summarizes the state of the art of responsible design for those living with dementia, spawning the global Dignity Design Manifesto [www.DesignDignity.Dementia.com](http://www.DesignDignity.Dementia.com) circulated online for signatories and comment.

## **CRE Montréal • Emmanuel Rondia**

Based in Halifax, Nova Scotia, Zuppa Theatre aims to make extraordinary experiences that provoke the consideration of new perspectives and ideas. It prioritizes questions over answers, and the discovery of possibility over the depiction of what is. This compels Zuppa Theatre to experiment with new forms and grapple with relevant questions of our time. They attempt to do this as generously as possible and have developed a unique collaborative process that favours the intuitive over the formulaic and thrives on the play between the imagined and the real. They make shows for Halifax and for places far away, with the support of The Canada Council for the Arts, Arts Nova Scotia, and The Nova Scotia Department of Communities, Culture, Tourism and Heritage, and Halifax Culture and Events.
